Fall Yard Sale Slated for October 6

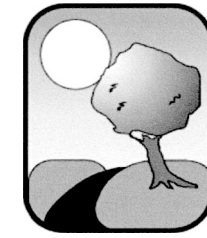


Look for bargains throughout the cooperative all day long on

Three months of free carrying charges awarded as door prize during bylaws vote

Cooperative members will vote on new bylaws and fill one position on the board of directors at the annual meeting on Tuesday, September 18.

A question-and-answer session will be held after the election to discuss revisions to the bylaws.

A special door prize -- three months of free carrying charges -- will be awarded for members participating in the bylaws vote.

The bylaws require a majority vote of the membership to pass.

The bylaws were revised by cooperative attorney Dudley Leonard to remove references to FHA and HUD and to update them with the way the cooperative currently operates. For example, in Section 2 of Article IV, the "third Thursday" was changed to the "third Tuesday" in September as the date of the annual meeting.

The meeting will be held at Bridger Middle School, 18200 E. Missouri 78, just east of Highleah. Please enter through the back door on the north side at the back of the building.

The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. Door prizes for the annual meeting will be awarded: first prize of a month's free carrying charges, second prize of \$50 and third prize of \$25.

Only members in good standing can vote. Any member with an unpaid balance of more than 30 days cannot vote. If you cannot attend, you may vote by proxy.

Members voting by proxy must appoint another member in good standing to vote on their behalf. No attending member may cast more than his or her vote plus one proxy vote.

The regular monthly board of directors meeting on September 17 will be closed.

OPEN SESSION, July 16, 2012 NEWSLETTER MINUTES

Dorinda Meihls, first vice president, called the meeting to order at 6 p.m. Other board members present were Paula Goth, second vice president; John Baggs, secretary; and Todd McQuade, treasurer.

Also attending were Carol Gibson, on-site manager; Kevin McQuade, maintenance superintendent; Dudley Leonard, cooperative attorney; Melva Linville, property manager, and Suzanne Miles, human relations coordinator, with Linville Management Services, Inc.; and John Morton of American Homeland Security.

Signing in for the open session were 16 members and guests.

John read aloud the minutes from the June 18 meeting. The minutes were approved.

Carol discussed the on-site manager's report. In June, there were 33 statements of credit, 42 statements of charges due, eight attorney referrals, 44 defaults and five exterminations. Three installation permits were received and approved.

The fall yard sale is October 6 with a rain date of October 13.

Twenty-seven units are on the market: eight three-bedroom units (five are sold), 18 two-bedroom units (one is sold); and one one-bedroom unit. Seven of the units are still occupied.

The board voted unanimously to accept Carol's report.

Kevin presented the maintenance report. In June, 182 work orders were completed. There have been two move-outs and one move-in.

The grounds were mowed twice. Grub control and fertilizer were applied. Eighteen rehabs are in various stages of completion.

The board voted unanimously to accept Kevin's report.

John reported for the Activities Committee. White Elephant Bingo will be at 7 p.m. on Friday, August 10, in the clubroom.

Dorinda opened the floor to member comments. Parking regulations, recent acts of vandalism, security patrols, pet regulations and a church-sponsored community event were discussed.

Morton explained that the phone number to call for security is 816.864.4548. The phone is not answered and members cannot leave a message. They must enter their phone numbers and hit the pound sign. The call will be returned.
